THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR and CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD



In May of 2017, R. Dauer Stackpole stepped down as Chairman of the Board of the Stackpole-Hall Foundation. Dauer joined the Foundation in 1974 and was elected Chair in 2007. Then, in November of 2017 he resigned his position as a Lifetime Trustee and was replaced by his sister Ms. Laurey Stackpole Turner. However, thankfully Dauer is not departing and he is filling the vacancy as a term trustee that opened when Ms. Turner move to Lifetime status. Dauer's actions were the result of health related issues that made it difficult for him to travel to board meetings from his home in Highlands, North Carolina to St. Marys, Pennsylvania.

Dauer's long involvement with the Foundation provided key leadership and sound governance judgement throughout his forty three year tenure. Since becoming a trustee, he was at the forefront of every decision that the Foundation made, including expanding the board, opening opportunities to younger generation Stackpoles and Halls, Long Range Planning, supporting the long standing Summer Jobs Program and serving as an advocate for the Foundation in all its dealings with the many organizations that the Foundation funded.

Having known Dauer since childhood, I cherish our lifelong friendship and his commitment to family, community and the Foundation; and I look forward to his continued involvement, his wit, his frankness and his love of his hometown.



SUMMER JOBS PROGRAM - \$123,395

The Stackpole-Hall Foundation, in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency (PHEAA), continued its successful Dr. William C. Conrad Summer Jobs Program which began in 1985. This program allows college students from Elk County to gain work experience, ideally in their field of study, from non-profit agencies. In the joint effort, the Foundation provides funding for 40% of the wages earned, the Pennsylvania State Work Study Program provides funding for 50%, and the employers are responsible for the remaining 10%.



YOUTH ADVISORY BOARD GRANTS - \$28,340

The Youth Advisory Board (YAB) was active from 2013 through 2017 as a way to encourage and develop philanthropic interest in the next generation of potential Trustees for the Foundation. The YAB used their own criteria to solicit and review grant proposals and select grant recipients, subject to final approval by the Board of Trustees. Independent Auditor's Report


